

## **Voting Rules**


- 1. You must reside within the zip code of 30205.

Background Color: The color blue in flags represents peace and justice, which has been prevalent throughout town history.

Key Features: Represent each of the six historic buildings in Brooks. The Putman Hotel, Market Hall, Town Hall, The Bank, and the Library are on the left side of the railroad tracks. On the right side of the railroad tracks is Brooks Elementary. The brown diagonal dividing line between the flag represents the railroad that travels

### Flower:


The flower is a Cherokee Rose, which is the state flower of GA, the state Brooks is proud to be located in.


### Letters:

Roundels

The six roundels along the edges of the flag represent the speed humps that are scattered throughout the town and are a common experience for the people of Brooks. They are yellow in color to reference the yellow 'hump' signs that indicate the presence of the humps on West Mcintosh and the Highway 85 Connector.

Star

The seven-pointed star white and red star is Brooks, with each of the points representing one of the seven main avenues to Brooks: Price Road, Highway 85 Connector, Brooks Road, Wast McIntosh Road, Woods Road, Brooks-Woolsey Road, and Morgan Mill Road. The red core of the star represents the



The church is a cornerstone of our community. It embodies the small town feel and the deep religious roots of our community.




Chief McIntosh is in the center of the flag. He signifies the initial settlement of our town and the spirit of perseverance and brother/sisterhood in our community. Our area was initially settled by Creek Indians before white settlers arrived. This image pays homage to them.

Chief McIntosh's silhouette is positioned inside our great state of Georgia, where our little community is proudly located.

The American flag symbolizes our wonderful country and the pride our community has in being part of America.

This image has been slightly altered from an old Brooks Road Race shirt graphic, which ties the old ways in with the new.

### Color

- The dark blue base represents the perseverance that the Brooks community has when faced with difficult times.
- Teal is a unique and underused color in everyday life, and as such its inclusion on this flag demonstrates the unique nature of the Brooks community
- Yellow represents the courage the founding members of this town had to be on the edge of civilization.

### Diamond


The diamond represents the municipal borders of Brooks and demonstrates that the community extends far beyond the borders of our town.

### Stars

An 8-pointed star represents harmony, and that harmony, which (usually) exists within this community, is what makes us a strong and unified people. The four 5-pointed stars that sit along the outside of the diamond represents Brooks four most important historic events.

- 1871: The construction of the railroad through town and the Brooks Station Depot.
- 1910: The incorporation of the town.
- 1920s: The Boll Weevil Depression and droughts that afflicted the town and destroyed its local economy.
- 1963: The reacceptance of the town charter.

As the years continue on, more stars can be added to the flag, though this should be a special and rare event.



### Stripes:

The white stripes represent new beginnings and the McIntosh Trail that was traveled on in order to get to Brooks. Without previous settlers being willing to start new, Brooks wouldn't be the town that it is today. In the small circles on the white stripes the date 1819 is repeated because this is when James and Peggy Haisten arrive in Brooks via the McIntosh Trail.

The red stripes represent the love we have for our country and our community. In the small circles on the red stripes the date 1823 is repeated because this is the first documented instance of property being won in the land lottery.

The blue stripes represent the serenity of living the country life. In small circles on the blue stripes the date 1910 is repeated because this is when the town of Brooks was incorporated.

### Chapel:

The church is located in the center of this flag because it is a cornerstone of our community. It embodies the small town feel and the deep religious roots of our community.

Base color


The base color is a dark blue, representing the ability to persevere that the people of Brooks seem to innately have.

Stripes

There are three stripes on the flag that come together underneath the main star, which represents the West McIntosh and 85 Connector intersection. The stripes are white, representing the kindness the community has for one another. The stripes also create an arrow that points towards Brooks' future.

### Stars

There are five total stars on the flag. The four simple stars represent the four other incorporated communities in Fayette County, Woolsey, Tyrone, Peachtree City, and Fayetteville. The fifth star sits on a circle of white which represents the boundary of incorporated Brooks. The grey ring around the star represents the railroad, which used to be the lifeblood of this community. The letters on this flag are a dark blue that was used because it matches the Town of Brooks logo; this ties the two together.


All of the letters on this flag are faintly outlined in the color teal. This color is the same color that is used on the Town of Brooks logo.

The light blue background represents the serenity of our community and is also a color found in the color wheel on the Town of Brooks logo, providing unity.







Our beautiful town has some of the best sunsets imaginable; this is why the setting sun is in the top left corner of our flag.




### Chevron

The teal chevron in front of the star is an arrow that represents Brooks traveling forward as we chart a new course into the 21st century.


### Star


























The blue colors are the ones found in our town logo and were used here for harmony.

The farm, cow, and landscape represent the strong agricultural roots of our community and the beauty of the country life.




The green background of the flag represents the creativity and generous spirit of this community along with the representation of our local farmers

The yellow in the design represents the optimism of the community. The 10 yellow half circles along the border of the flag serve as a reminder that while times change, the community will stand strong as long as we keep communication and our traditions.

The White baseball diamond is another reminder of that unity; however, this one's purpose is to remind us that at our very core, humans demand perfection of ourselves. This is a completely unattainable task that we placed value on.

The pine cone at the center of the flag at the center of the diamond is the final symbol of the flag and the symbol of protection. The pine cone is a reminder that at the core of all of us we are a safe community for ourselves and future generations.

This flag is more than just a design, it's a reflection of the spirit of our town. At the center is the oak tree, a timeless symbol of strength, stability, and endurance. Oaks are known for their deep roots and solid foundation — just like Brooks. They grow slowly, steadily, and last for generations. That tree represents our town's past, present, and future — firmly planted and built to last. Surrounding the oak is a white diamond, which stands for purity, unity, and clarity. It reminds us that while we come from different walks of life, we're part of one close-knit community. The diamond shape also creates a sense of focus — all eyes drawn to the heart of Brooks. The green field in each corner symbolizes the natural beauty that defines this place — the open pastures, quiet cow fields, dense woodlands, and rural peace that make Brooks special. It's a nod to the land itself — both how it shaped us and how we continue to live alongside Finally, the gold band adds a sense of honor and value. It represents the richness of our town's heritage — from the early settlers and farmers to the hardworking families and small-town values that still run strong today. It's a subtle but meaningful way to say: this place matters. Altogether, this flag isn't just a pretty piece of cloth. It's a visual story about who we are, what we've built, and what we hope to pass on.






Altogether, this flag doesn't need a lot of detail to say something big: Brooks is strong, timeless, and proud of where it's been and where it's going.
